

Who we are:

The University of Regina is one of the premiere comprehensive universities in Canada. It is home to 10 faculties and 25 academic departments with established reputations for excellence and innovative programs leading to bachelor, master, and doctoral degrees. Our programs have grown in response to the needs of the province and the economy, and offer an effective balance of scholarship, research, and public service that continues to attract national and international attention. Our student enrolment, including Aboriginal and international students, has grown considerably in recent years, with more than 14,000 full-time and part-time undergraduate and graduate students registered.

The University of Regina is comprised of a main and historic campus, as well as three federated colleges:

- Campion College, a Jesuit, liberal arts college which provides a unique university experience characterized by a strong sense of community and focus on personalized support;
- Luther College, which focuses on teaching within the faculties of Arts, Fine Arts, and Sciences, and prides itself on its student-centred approach; and
- First Nations University of Canada, which offers advanced learning, research, and employment opportunities for Aboriginal people, and explores the history, language, culture, and artistic heritage of First Nations peoples.

Our main and historic College Avenue campuses, covering 930 acres, provide an attractive environment for our students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The campus is located in the picturesque Wascana Centre, one of the largest urban parks in North America.
