Partnership Development Grants

Partnership Grants (2 stages - LOI and Formal)

Objectives and Design

- Create a simple, clear structure that moves beyond easy research distinctions
 - Reduction of over 30 separately branded programs to three programs with a limited number of funding opportunities
 - No separate competitions for thematic research
- Enable new, emerging, high-risk, and interdisciplinary forms of research, talent development, partnerships, and KMb
 - Any approach and combination of approaches is possible
 - Increased opportunities for international and intersectoral collaboration

Objectives and Design

- Embrace different types of research activity, scholarly traditions and sizes of proposals
 - More flexibility in grant size and duration
 - Involvement of a broader cross-section of experts in the merit review process
 - Merit-review experts are no longer required to undertake detailed revisions of the budget
- Define scholarly contribution, building on emphasis on journal articles & books, to include other means of mobilizing knowledge
 - Changes on application to allow a broader conception of research contributions
 - Included in evaluation criteria and adjudication committee guidelines

Objectives and Design

- Better support emerging scholars
 - Reserving a portion of the Insight Development Grant funds for applications from emerging scholars to ensure consistent success for emerging and established scholars
- Better capture the outcomes and impacts of research in the humanities & social sciences
 - Developing new mandatory reporting requirements for completed grants that focus on outputs, results and impacts
 - Knowledge mobilization plan required on all applications

Harmonization of procedures and program regulations

- application procedures and forms
- regulations and definitions relating to grant applications
- assessment criteria (Challenge, Feasibility and Capability are common to all funding opportunities, but their respective weighting varies from one funding opportunity to another)

Renewal of SSHRC's Talent program

- Adopt a consistent approach to research training across the Talent, Insight and Connection programs
- Expand partnership opportunities to support research training
- Implement changes to those funding opportunities offering direct support to graduate students and postdoctoral researchers
 - Doctoral funding
 - Postdoctoral funding
- Harmonize tri-agency funding opportunities

What SSHRC is hearing

External observers of the competitions have:

- Confirmed that the excellence of SSHRC's merit-review processes has been maintained
- Remarked on the benefits of the changes to the meritreview process

According to post-application surveys since 2011, respondents:

- generally found the information they were looking for with ease
- found the information to be clear
- transition issues: (Research Portal, CCCV)

What SSHRC is hearing


- New types of activities & partnerships have been enabled
- Creation of "development" grants (IDG/PDG) wellreceived; positive impact for emerging scholars
- Uncertainty regarding thematic research
- Balance between partnership & individual/small team grants
- Concern about decreasing success rates
- Concern with funding of small projects

New Activities and Approaches


- New activities (e.g., Partnered Research Training Initiatives, Support of Tools for Research and Related Activities)

- Cross-sectoral and International Collaboration







IDG and PDG - Support for Emerging & Established Scholars







Thematic Research - # of applications







Thematic Research - # of applications






% of Expenditures

Selected Funding Opportunities – Post Program Architecture Renewal











What SSHRC is doing

- Clarification regarding merit review of proposed budgets in grant applications
- Firm upper limits for IG and PG
- Continued engagement with the community (e.g., SSHRC Leaders meeting, Congress, etc.)
- Continuous monitoring and analysis of competition results, trends, etc.
- Allocation of Budget 2014 funds

Budget 2014

- \$7M p.a. to support advanced research in the social sciences and humanities
- Fostering Social Innovation through Research at Colleges and Polytechnics (\$10M 2-year pilot)
- \$9M p.a. for the Indirect Costs Program
- Canada First Research Excellence Fund (\$1.5B over ten years)
- Not-for-profit organizations with an economic orientation now eligible for Mitacs programs
- \$3M over three years to create the Open Data Institute
